Inawashiro, lauded by the majestic Lake Inawashiro, is positioned in the center of Fukushima Prefecture. Blessed by its natural surroundings, it offers enjoyment year round from marine sports to skiing.

"Hideyo Noguchi and Inawashiro"

The world-renowned medical scientist, Hideyo Noguchi was born in 1876 in the village of Okinajima in Yama, Fukushima (present-day Inawashiro Town). As a child, he suffered a severe burn on his left hand, but was able to overcome his handicap after learning of the wonders of medicine, and he poured his fervor into saving the people of the world.

Cherry Blossoms of Kamegajo Castle Park

Peak season: end of April - beginning of May

The park was constructed around the remains of Kamegajo Castle, the oldest castle built on a plain field in Japan. The park is also a popular cherry blossom viewing site. The snow capped Mt. Bandai contrasting the colors of cherry blossoms of the park is truly a site to behold.

Mt. Bandai and Field Mustard Blossoms

Peak season: end of April - mid-May

Field mustard blossoms at the Inawashiro Herb Garden, adjacent to the Hotel Listel Inawashiro. Approximately 1.5 million blossoms stretch across roughly 1500 sqm. in a yellow carpet. *Entrance requires an additional admission fee. TEL: 0242-66-2690





Cherry Blossoms of Lake Inawashiro Lakeside (Shida Beach)

MAP P2 F-4 area

Peak season: mid-April - end of April

The cherry blossoms that bloom along the Lake Inawashiro lakeside against the backdrop of Mt. Bandai. It is a popular hidden cherry blossom viewing spot.



Peak season: end of April - beginning of May

Hoshina Masayuki of the Aizu domain is deified at Hanitsu Shrine. The cherry blossom trees found within its grounds were a gift from the town of Takato in Nagano Prefecture.





Cherry Blossoms of Myoke MAP P1 D-3 area

Peak season; end of April - beginning of May

The lines of blooming cherry trees around the Tokyo Electric Power Company's Akimoto Power Plant are called "Myoke-no Sakura" and a much beloved cherry blossom viewing spot.



Fringed Irises of the Former Villa of Takamatsunomiya in Okina Island.

Peak season:beginning of May - end of June

These fringed irises known as Himeshaga in Japanese (perennial Iridaceae designated quasi-endangered plants) bloom in the area surrounding the traditional Japanese style villa highlighted by its natural landscape garden. Inquiries: Tenkyokaku TEL.0242-65-2811



Cherry blossoms of Tenkyodai

Peak season: beginning of May - end of May

The cherry blossoms bloom on this elevated land with sweeping views of Lake Inawashiro. In 1970 the Showa Emperor and Empress were welcomed here for the National Tree Planting Festival.



Cherry Blossoms of Choei Bokujo (town pasture)

Peak season: end of April - beginning of May

This is a pasture that spreads at the skirt of Mt. Bandai. Its road, stretching for approximately lkm, is affectionately called "Makiba no Sakura Road" (the pasture cherry blossom road) as it is lined on both sides with cherry blossom trees.



Tenkvokaku

Peak season: end of April - beginning of May

Said to be derived from one of the Immortal Poets, Li Bai's poems. The Taisho Emperor gave this location its name.




Rice Paddies and Mt. Bandai

Every year at the beginning of May on clear, sunny days, the new greenery of Mt. Bandai as it reflects inverted on the freshly planted rice paddies weaves a magnificent view with the blue skies.



Designated as the first "cultural assets of Fukushima green," this tree which is older than 1,120 years old is recognized as one of the five famous Aizu cherry blossom trees. It received its name from the fact that its blossoms start out white but gradually change to the color of deer fur. It is a rare variety whose stamens turn green from the center of the flower making it look as though leaves are sprouting. The Enmusubi (betrothal) cherry blossoms that bloom in the split torii cedar are also popular.





Camping

There are several camparounds located at the foot of Mt. Bandai offering breathtaking views of Lake Inawashiro or on the shores of the lake itself, *Charges apply at all sites.



Cycling

The Inawashiro Cycling Road stretching roughly 3 6km from east to west offers a refreshing ride as you feel the wind of Inawashiro. The road can be thoroughly enjoyed as a walking path.



Boat Tours

A recreational cruise on Lake Inawashiro, also known as "Lake Tenkyo" (heavenly mirror) because it reflects Mt. Bandai on its surface. The cruise ships "Kamemaru" and "Hakuchomaru" are very popular.



Lavender

With a view of Mt. Bandai behind it, this is a paradise of flowers and fragrance from the approximately 500 different types of herbs blooming throughout the year.



Lake Swimming

You can enjoy swimming in a freshwater lake just like you would in the ocean. There are also spots where the lake is shallow and the surface is calm.



Trekking

Mt. Bandai is one of the selected 100 Famous Japanese Mountains, Beautiful to look at, and fun to dimb.



The Bandai Festival, with its themes of "prayer" and "gratitude," began as a memorial to those who lost their lives in the eruption of Mt. Bandai. Beginning with the memorial service for the martyrs of the Mt. Bandai eruption on July 15, the end of July is filled with events such as the subtle and profound procession of the Mt. Bandai holy fire torch parade and the Aizu-Bandaisan dance are held.







Tenkyodai

From the forested park that spreads over a plateau elevated 800km above the southern foot of Mt. Bandai, you can overlook the autumn scenery of Mt. Bandai and Lake lnawashiro, so clear it appears to be the mirror of the heavens.



Tatsusawa Fudotaki Falls

Water flowing like a bamboo screen, the solemn Fudotaki Falls contrasting with the vivid colors of the changing beech and maple leaves makes this a beautiful spot to see the autumn foliage.



🬟 Nakatsugawa Gorge

In autumn, the maple, alder, and wild cherry trees are dyed in vivid fall colors. The gorge can be reached on foot from the adjacent rest house in 15 minutes.



Shiraito Falls

The hot spring water from the remains of the sulphur mine as it falls from the 150m cliff made from lava looks as if it is one long white thread (shiraito) creating a stunning site.





Bandai-Azuma Skyline

Total length28.7 km MAP P2 A-5 area

This sightseeing road connecting Inawashiro with Fukushima City has been selected as one of the top 100 roads in Japan, boasting the country's greatest difference in elevation and beautiful views along this mountain road.



Total length13.1 km MAP P2 C-4 area

Connecting the Bandai-Azuma Skyline with the Bandai Highlands, it also boasts panoramic views of the "Three Lake Paradise" made up of Lake Hibara, Lake Onogawa, and Lake Akimoto.





Bandaisan Gold Line

Total length17.6km MAP P1 D-2 area

This road connects Urabandai and Aizu. The site of Mt. Bandai's caldera cliff before your eyes is overwhelming.



🔆 Lake Inawashiro Swans

Every winter approximately 3,000 swans come here. The white-capped Mt. Bandai and the blue waters giving Lake Inawashiro its Juster are in beautiful contrast to the white swans.



Tatsusawa Fudotaki Falls MAP P2 D-5 area

The winter landscape and silent surroundings combine to create a solemn world.*The nearby parking lot cannot be reached in winter. You must change into snowshoes along the way when seeking out the waterfall.



Snowshoeing

An inspirational experience enabling you to see stunning views and sites only winter can offer. A guide offers explanations and snowshoe rental is available for a fee.



At Tenjin Beach on Lake Inawashiro, the wind and high sprays create "Shibukigori," natural ice sculptures. The waterspray freezes and adheres to the surrounding trees and pressure ridges, and together with the drift ice that attaches to it, it becomes a rare and beautiful work of art as if Lake Inawashiro and winter are having their own celebrations.

The Old Battlefield of Surjagehara MAP P1 E-2 area

In 1589, Ashina Yoshihiro with his army numbering 16,000 men, and the 23,000 men in Data Masamune's army went to battle at Suriagehara. Date, the victor of the battle then moved his residence from Yonezawa to Kurokawa Castle (present day Tsuruga Castle).

Historic Shrines

The site where Hoshina Masavuki of the Aizu clan is enshrined and other sites around the Bandai foothills and shores of Lake Inawashiro.



Inawashiro Castle Remains (Kamegajo Castle)

MAP P1 E-3 area

For generations this plain field castle built in the middle ages in the southern foothills of Mt. Bandai was the residence of the Inawashiro family. The stone and earthen walls still remain telling of its former glory.



Kobirakata Tenmangu Shrine (Town designated Cultural Property)

MAP P1 F-3 area

One of Japan's three great Tenjin shrines, it is dedicated to the god of scholarship, Sugawarano-Michizane.

Sanchu-hi Stone Monument (Town designated historic site) MAP P1 E-2 area

A stone monument dedicated to the three vassals (Kanagami Moriharu, Sase Tanetsune, and Sase Tsuneo) who martyred themselves in battle to save their lord so that generations after may be reminded of their loyalty.

■ Hanitsu Shrine · Okuno - In (inner shrine) (nationally designated historic site)

MAP P1 E-3 area

This shrine was built on the tomb of Hoshina Masayuki, leader of the Aizu clan, and one of the three virtuous Edo rulers. The inner shrine houses the grave (a stone for calming the soul) of Hoshina.



Iwahashi Shrine and Torii Cedar MAP P1 E-3 area

This shrine represents more than 1500 years of history in the Aizu region. It is also known for the 800-year old torii cedar and the "Enmusubi-zakura" (betrothal cherry blossom tree) rooted there.



The Boshin War

The Aizu fought intensely and proudly against the new government forces from the Edo period through the Meiji period.

This was a Japanese war fought from 1868 to 1869, when the Aizu clan joined forces with the old shogunate forces and the Ouetsu-reppan alliance against the new government's military led by the Satsuma-Choshu clans who established the Meiji government after the Restoration.





Site of the Old Battlefield of Bonari-toge

MAP P2 D-5 area

In 1868, 800 troops of the alliance's army (eastern army) fell to the 3,000 troops of the new government's army (western army). The soldiers of the eastern army are buried here and memorialized with a monument.

Monument to the Martyrs of the Boshin War

MAP P2 D-5 area

A monument inscribed with the tanka poem Saigo Tanomo read at the Aizu clan martyr memorial service in 1889.



Post-Meiji Period

Asaka Canal, at the cornerstone of Japan's modernization and Tenkyokaku, which takes advantage of Inawashiro's scenic location, were part of the foundation in Japan's development.


This is a European-style building built in honor of Lake Inawashiro's beauty in 1908 by Prince Arisugawa Takehito.



Asaka Canal (Ju-rokkyo Bridge)

MAP P1 F-2 area

The Asaka Canal was built to carry the water of Lake Inawashiro across 52 km using the natural differences in elevation. The canal hydrates the Asaka plain which was the foundation of development for present-day Koriyama.



MAP P1 F-2 area

The birthplace and research materials of Dr. Hideyo Noguchi are displayed here. Learn about the life of the doctor through the many relics and materials he left behind.



Mt. Bandai Eruption

The eruption of Mt. Bandai in 1888 caused a volcanic mud flow which brought large rocks and boulders causing a vast amount of damage.



Mine-no Oh-ishi

MAP P1 E-3 area

A giant pyroxene andesite boulder 8.2m in length and 3m in height that was brought with the volcanic mud flow when Mt. Bandai erupted. It is a rarity academically as well.

Mt. Bandai is the symbol of Fukushima Prefecture and one of the 100 Famous Japanese Mountains.



Inawashiro starting point

The ski slope overlooking Lake Inawashiro is the starting point equipped with a parking lot and hot spring bathing facilities.



2 Shibutani starting point

This route takes you through a lush forest making it the best path to see clusters of alpine plants and be immersed in the refreshing air.



6 Kawakami starting point

This course offers a view of Mt. Kushigamine from afar and an up close view of the caldera. There are several accommodations with hot springs at this starting point.



6 Happoudai starting point

This route features relatively little variation in elevation making it easy to climb, even for beginners.




4 Urabandai starting point

In contrast to the front side of the mountain, you can enjoy climbing while observing the rough lava walls and groups of lakes.



60kinajima starting point

This course is for experienced climbers as it requires ascending a steep incline. The lide mountain range can be seen in the distance.

Mt. Bandai

The town of Inawashiro is home to three active volcanoes, Mt. Bandai, Mt. Adatara, and Mt. Azuma, which means it has plentiful hot water sources. The natural discharge from the source of Numajiri Motoyu is among the highest in Japan from a single source boasting 13,400 liters per minute.



2Numajiri Onsen

A quiet inn nestled in the mountains opened in the Edo period.

A therapeutic bath since the Edo period. It is also called the bath of longevity.

This hot spring pumps water from its own source at 1,200m below ground. The Hotel Listel Inawashiro pumps the water.

Inawashiro shidahama Onsen

A natural hot spring on the shore of Lake Inawashiro. You can watch as the sun sinks into the lake while taking a dip here.

Local sake

Blessed by the famed peak, Mt. Bandai, this local brewery has insisted on using unfiltered malt in the making of its sake since its establishment in 1848. There are many popular items like the "Shichijuro" series.



Original wine

Using glass barrels for fermentation and aging, this wine is composed purely with fruit giving it a fresh taste. The fruit is mainly sourced locally or from the Tohoku region in order to make this valuable "brewed in Aizu" wine.







Inawashiro local beer

The five varieties of beer that are brewed with traditional methods that insist upon quality ingredients, equipment, and skills, have all won prizes at the "International Beer Cup" successively.



Inawashiro "Ten-no-Tsubu" (heaven's grains)

The tradition Aizu rice, cultivated with pure water from Mt. Aizu-Bandai has evolved even further. It is highly regarded even in the greater Tokyo area.



Wappa-meshi

A local specialty eaten from a round wooden paulownia serving dish called "magewappa." Inawashiro-grown ancient rice is topped with mountain vegetables, himetake bamboo, butterbur, daikon, lotus root, and minced chicken from locally raised Aizu chickens and then steamed.



A local specialty from the Aizu region of Fukushima Prefecture. It is a soup using stock taken from scallops as its base, with plenty of fixings, including taro, carrots, konnyaku noodles, shiitake and cloud ear mushrooms.





Ramen

The elastic, curly, flat, thick noodles are served with char siu pork prepared using an original method and sauce that gives Aizu region ramen its unique flavor, making the ramen beloved by everyone from young to old.

Sasa dango (dumplings)

This Japanese sweet has been popular since ancient times in the Aizu region. It is a vomogi (mugwort) dumpling filled with grainy sweet bean paste and wrapped in a bamboo leaf tied with igusa (rush). The dumplings boast an abundant natural flavor.



■ Youkan (sweet bean ielly)

This refreshing youkan is characterized by its subtle sweetness and juicy and ielly-like consistency.

Agemaniu (Fried steamed buns)

Agemaniu are made entirely by hand. It has a relaxingly sweet and mild texture and a flavor that is nostalgic.



Inawashiro Specialty ItemIty Item

Tempura Maniu

One of the most recommended food items of the Aizu region. It is popular as a snack or also as a topping on soba.

Hand crafts

Inawashiro Kokeshi Dolls

Inawashiro is where the googly-eyed dolls, "Tako-bozu" and "Ao-bozu" (Nakanosawa Traditional Kokeshi Dolls), crafted at the foot of Mt. Bandai originated.

Origins of the Nakanosawa Kokeshi Dolls

There are two types of dolls affectionately called "Tako-bozu" (octopus head) and "Ao-bozu" (blue head) with an insertable structure. "Tako-bozu" depicts a modern beauty. Her body is decorated in peonies and cherry blossoms, and she wears an affable expression on her face. The head of the "Ao-bozu" is green in color with eyes that slant upward, and its body is striped with lines reminiscent of a potter's wheel and it wears an expressive face.



Sightseeing Hideyo Noguchi Memorial Hall **Facilities** (Noguchi Hidevo Kinen-kan)



The birthplace and research material display room of Dr. Hideyo Noguchi, whose face adorns the thousand ven note, are located here. The hearth and tokobashira (alcove post) from his birth home still remain.

Aquamarine Inawashiro Kingfishers Aquarium

The freshwater aquarium and fishing pond are managed integrally. At the aquarium, aquatic animals can be observed in an ecological setting, and opportunities to get an up-close view of various forms of life and the wonders of natural environments are offered. There is also a hands-on experience corner with a "life education" theme, where fish that are caught in the fishing pond can be eaten.
